MENU FOR WEDNESDAY, JUNE 13

Breakfast: Orange juice, dry cereal with cream, baked eggs, braised mutton, marmalade, coffee.

Luncheon: Tuna cosmopolitan salad, wheat bread sandwiches, cherry tarts, tea.

Dinner: Tomato bouillon, baked slice of ham, ratin sauce, Lyonnaise potatoes, green peas, cucumber salad, French dressing, corn-starch pudding, strawberry sauce, coffee.

TUNA COSMOPOLITAN SALAD

One can Tuna, 4 stalks celery, 1-3 cup French dressing, 1-3 cup mayonnaise, 2 hard cooked eggs, 1 cup cooked green peas, 2 sliced tomatoes, 1 sliced cucumber, 4 green and 4 ripe olives, 1 head lettuce, 16 stalks green asparagus. Break up Tuna with a fork, marinate with two tablespoons of French dressing. Add chopped celery to this mixture. Place this on lettuce leaves in the centre of a platter. Cover with mayonnaise, garnish with olives and slices of hard cooked eggs. Arrange nests of lettuce around this mound of Tuna and fill the nests with the various green vegetables. Add the remaining French dressing to the vegetables.

THE OLD GARDENER

Many of the hundreds of new rock gardens, made this year, are proving disappointing now because of the lack of bloom. Alpines and other typical rock garden plants need a year or two to become established and to make a creditable appearance. In the meantime the garden maker may well console himself with annuals, some of which do not look at all out of place in a rock garden. Naturally only low-growing kinds should be chosen, and those with heavy foliage should be avoided. Very good kinds include the dainty annual baby's breath, the dwarf annual lupin, Drummond's phlox, portulaca, Statice sinuata, Silene aemula, California poppy, annual flax, Alyssum maritimum and Asperula orientalis. All these can be grown with perfect ease. Probably the best way to use the seeds is to sow them broadcast, allowing the plants to come up wherever they may. This gives a very natural effect and a fine color effect.

BAKED EGGS AND BACON

Fry 2 slices of thinly sliced bacon for each egg used. Arrange the crisp bacon in groups of two and break an egg on each group. Bake in hot oven.
