2) VETERINARY ASPECT “A”

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations, Art. 1011, 9th Edition, 1st January 2002 & the Jumping Rules, Annex VII, 21st edition effective 1st January 2003.

THE VETERINARY INSPECTION WILL TAKE PLACE ON THURSDAY 18 SEPTEMBER 2003 BETWEEN 3.00 & 7.00 PM.

“General Regulations”, 20th Edition, revised 2001, will apply:

Art. 139.1

Every horse entered for any competition at CSNs or CSI* in a foreign country, and all horses entered for other CSI**/**/*/*/*/*/*/*/*/*, CSIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official, valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 139.2

Horses taking part in CSNs and CSI* in their own country are not required to have such a passport as mentioned in paragraph 1. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable by diagram. Unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country of origin all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, VET. REGS. APPENDIX VI (except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given no less than 21 days and no more than 92 days apart.

In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding 12 months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must

have been given within the preceding 7 days including the day of the competition or of entry into the competition stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer's instructions, which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling. In many cases booster injections are recommended by the manufacturers and by National Veterinary Authorities/Regulatory Authorities at intervals more frequent than 12 months.

SAMPLING FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES (Vet. Regs. Chapter V & VI and Annex III)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCI***/*, CSI***/*/*, CIOs, World Cup Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CIs sampling is recommended. In CICs***/*, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Art. VR 1017.4).

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME (GROUPS I & II ONLY)

The Organizing Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.

3) VETERINARY ASPECTS "B"

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES

All the horses from EEC countries taking part in the show must possess the official veterinary health certificates approved by the EEC Board of Directors 90/422/6 dated 26.06.1990, and subsequent amendment EEC 92/130 dated 13.02.1992.

IX MISCELLANEOUS

1) OBJECTIONS/ COMPLAINTS (Art. 167,168,170 & 171)

All complaints and objections to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150 or equivalent.

2) **GENERAL CLASSIFICATION AT THE END OF THE COMPETITIONS**

- Bronze Equestrian Trophy to the first classified Riders of each category.
- Rosettes to all the first ten classified Riders.

3) **PRIZE – GIVING CEREMONY**

At the end of each class, the first ten placed competitors shall enter the main arena for the presentations. The first ten competitors must ride the horse on which they competed unless excused by the Ground Jury (Art. 248).

4) **DOCTOR, VETERINARIAN, FARRIER**

Veterinary and medical assistance, as well as farriery services, are available for the duration of the show. These are at the expense of those requesting them.

5) **INSURANCES**

“All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third persons caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date”.

The OC renounce all responsibility for any injuries occurring to owners, riders, horses and stable staff caused by accidents and/or illness, and for all loss of property due to theft, damages, fire or mishaps. The participants will meet all repatriation costs following any accidents. Through their entry in the competition, the participants accept that the OC cannot be held responsible for any accidents during the jumping events, and before or after these.

6) **DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES AND INDEMNITIES (Art. 130)**

Prize money will be paid in Euros at the end of the last class..

7) **EVENTS’ ORGANIZATION (Art. 115.2)**

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of Chefs d’Equipe and Ground Jury the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all competitors and officials as soon as possible and they must be reported to the Secretary General by the Foreign Judge.

8) **ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS (Art. 133)**

The OC will issue each competitor a maximum of 2 bracelets for entry into the FEI stable area, each groom with 1 bracelet and each owner with a maximum of 2 bracelets.

9) **DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY**

Prize money in appendix A is net of taxes.

10) **SCHOOLING DURING COMPETITIONS**

Riders wishing to school during speed competitions must inform the OC before these competitions begin. These riders will start first in these competitions.

12) **LATE WITHDRAWAL OF ENTERED HORSES SUBSTITUTION**

The OC reserves the right to seek an indemnity of €150 per horse from definitely entered participants who withdraw one or more horses from the event after 12.00 am of saturday 13 September 2003. In the event that a rider withdraws all of his horses after the indicated deadline, the OC reserves the right if necessary to seek siad indemnity via the rider’s N.F. This does not preclude or substitute any action on the part of the FEI subsequent to mention of late or unadvised withdrawals in the foreign judge’’ report. The OC will accept substitution of horses and riders until 10.00 am of thursday 18 September 2003.

13) DISPUTES

In the event of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages) the English one will be decisive.

STABLE SECURITY/STEWARDING AT INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

1. ACCESS TO STABLE AREA

For an optimal stable security, the stables must be completely enclosed within a suitably restrictive perimeter (stable area) which will act both as deterrent to the admission of unauthorised persons and to the exit of horses. The area must be sufficiently large to allow horses to be evacuated from the stables in an emergency, but still remain within the confines of the perimeter. However, several disciplines allow in specific situations a lower level of stable security (see discipline rules).

Whenever possible the stable area must include only stables – lorries, caravans, et., should not be permitted within the area unless specifically needed as accommodation for horses and/or grooms.

Access to stables must be limited to those persons indicated in VRs Art. 1005.2.5.2. It is essential that the official issuing authorised access be a responsible person of seniority within the Organising Committee.

2. CONTROL OF ACCESS

A control system must operate at all entrance gates so that there is an efficient and reliable method of identifying those who enter and leave the stable area at any time.

Extra vigilance must be used in establishing the identity of persons and reasons for entering the stables during the night.

3. STEWARDING OF STABLE AREA

At least one stable steward directly responsible to the Chief Steward must be present or readily available in the vicinity of the stable area 24 hours a day during the entire duration of the event. Deputies as required may assist him. The steward/deputies must regularly patrol the stable area, without establishing any predetermined pattern, to discourage any form of illegal practices or abuses to horses. Any misdemeanours must immediately be reported to the stable steward who must, in turn, report to the Chief Steward.

The duty of the stewards is therefore to safeguard the welfare of the horses and to prevent any form of illegal practices.

4. GROOMS

It is appreciated that grooms wish to remain with their horses during the night. Only grooms duly registered with the OC are permitted to do so.

The Person Responsible must ensure that his/her grooms, or any other authorised persons with access to his/her horses, are familiar with the security and stewarding procedures operating at the event attended.

5. MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT EVENT GROUNDS

Movement of horses between the stables, practice, grazing and main arena must be strictly controlled. The optimum layout for Jumping and Dressage disciplines is attached. It is appreciated that flexibility will be required depending on the requirements of other disciplines.

6. STEWARDING OF PRACTICE ARENA

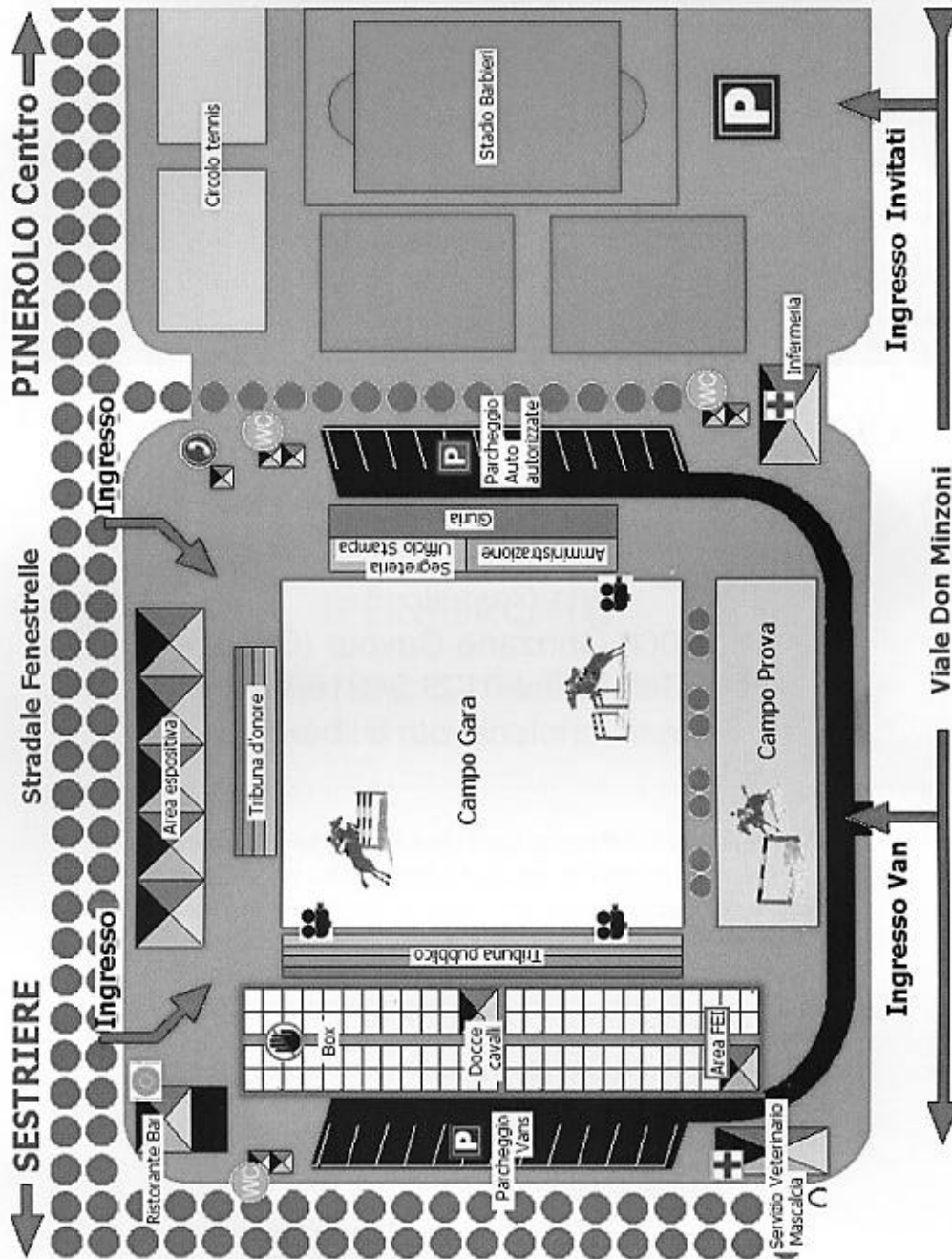
The Chief Steward must ensure that each practice arena is adequately stewarded at all times that it/they are officially open. He must also ensure that all practice arenas are subject to random control when they are officially closed.

7. GRAZING ARENA

It is recommended that a grazing area be provided at all outdoor events and that this be subject to random control. If available, horses must be grazed or walked in hand within this area.

The Foreign Judge/TD at events will be specifically asked to check that the relevant requirements are met, as reasonably as can be expected depending on the discipline, and to clearly indicate any shortfalls, following which consideration may be given to altering the category of the event in future.

WELFARE OF THE HORSE
CODE OF CONDUCT

- 1) In all equestrian sports the horse must be considered paramount.
- 2) The wellbeing of the horse shall be above the demands of breeders, trainers, owners, dealers, organiser, sponsors or officials.
- 3) All handling and veterinary treatment must ensure the health and welfare of the horse.
- 4) The highest standards of nutrition, health, sanitation and safety shall be encouraged and maintained at all times.
- 5) Adequate provision must be made for ventilation, feeding, watering and maintaining a healthy environment during transportation.
- 6) Emphasis should be placed on increasing education in training and equestrian practices and on promoting scientific studies in equine health.
- 7) In the interests of the horse, the fitness and competence of the rider shall be regarded as essential.
- 8) All riding and training methods must take account of the horse as a living entity and must not include any technique considered by the FEI to be abusive.
- 9) National Federations should establish adequate controls in order that all persons and bodies under their jurisdiction respect the welfare of the horse.
- 10) The national and international Rules and Regulations in equestrian sport regarding the health and welfare of the horse must be adhered to not only during national and international events, but also in training. Competition Rules and Regulations should be continually reviewed to ensure such welfare.
